Words of Institution

Sharing the Bread and the Cup

Notes on Today's Music

†**Ernst Flügel** was born in Stetting, Germany. He taught singing at the *Gymnasium* and in 1879 was appointed Kantor at the Bernhardinkirche in Breslau. His setting of “Vom Himmel Hoch” has the chorale melody in the pedal under three voices which chase each other along in canon in the manual part. This setting was probably written to be used as an introduction to the singing of the hymn since it only states the hymn tune once, it is in the same key as the hymn and the melody in the pedal plays the hymn tune at the tempo at which it would have been sung in Herr Flügel’s time.

†**J.S. Bach** was particularly interested in this chorale and wrote several organ settings of it. This morning’s is from his *Orgelbüchlein*, a collection of choral settings written around 1714 when Bach was in Weimar. This “Vom Himmel Hoch” is an energetic statement of the chorale tune singing over intertwining counterpoint between the alto and tenor voices and a pedal part that moves along resolutely in eighth notes. To conclude, you will hear the original hymn to which these chorale preludes would have been introductions.

¹**From Heaven Above to Earth I Come** begins the text of the old German chorale that is the basis of this morning’s opening voluntaries. Martin Luther wrote the text, and the tune is from the *Geistliche Lieder* of 1539. The Presbyterian Hymnal has four of the original fourteen verses at #54.

²**Phos Hilaron** (Ancient Greek: Φῶς Ἰλαρόν, romanized: *Fós Ilarón*) is an ancient Christian hymn originally written in Koine Greek. Often referred to by its Latin title *Lumen Hilare*, it has been translated into English as *O Gracious Light*. It is the earliest known Christian hymn recorded outside of the Bible that is still in use today. The hymn is part of vespers in the *Byzantine Rite*, and also included in some modern Anglican and Lutheran liturgies.

NEW SUNDAY SCHOOL OFFERING

After a year of studying the entire breadth of the Bible, there are certainly things that we need to go back and study further. On January 19, we will be launching into a year of studying the parables of Jesus—what he likely meant by them, how who we are affects what meaning we ascribe to the parable itself, and more. We will be reading the following books together: *Short Stories by Jesus: The Enigmatic Parables of a Controversial Rabbi* by Amy-Jill Levine, *One Coin Found: How God's Love Stretches to the Margins* by Emmy Kegler, *Bible through the Lens of Trauma* by Elizabeth Boase and Christopher G.
